First Reading

Thomas believes because he sees Jesus.


Today's reading from the Gospel of John is proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter in each of the lectionary cycles. This fact alone should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus that are described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit, but in bodily form. We do not know, however, exactly what this form looked like. Earlier in John's Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the risen Jesus, she did not recognize him until he spoke to her. In Luke's Gospel, the disciples walking along the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in his resurrected form, Jesus was not bound by matter; he appeared to the disciples inside a home even though the door was locked. Yet the disciples could still touch the marks of his Crucifixion.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun; as Jesus was sent by God, so Jesus sends his disciples. He gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be able to accomplish this task. Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share forgiveness and reconciliation with others.

Thomas, the doubting disciple in today's reading, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first..

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY



On the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter be called "Divine Mercy Sunday."

St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions from Jesus, including one of Jesus wearing a white garment with beams of red and white coming from His heart, which came to be known as the image of Divine Mercy. She [wrote in her diary that He said:](#)

I want the Image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it...

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy.

Divine Mercy Sunday focuses on the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. As Pope John Paul II stated, "Divine Mercy reaches human beings through the heart of Christ crucified."

disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. Our human nature seeks hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to his disciples after his death is indeed the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative in obtaining this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe. [Loyolapress.com](#)

Churches Remain Open During Stay-at-home Order

The Government of Ontario will launch a province-wide stay-at-home order starting on Thursday, April 8, 2021. Ontarians are asked to stay at home except for essential matters.

Acknowledging that religious practice is essential in the lives of many Ontarians, the provincial government has not changed the **current 15 per cent capacity limit for places of worship**, while maintaining two metres/six feet of physical distance between households.

Your local parish will continue to celebrate Mass as it has over the past several weeks.

Funeral Masses and services remain limited to 50 people, including the priest and those assisting him (but not including funeral home staff). In-person meetings in parishes remain cancelled. Parish staff are working remotely.

Stay Safe

This is a very serious moment in the pandemic. The province is running out of hospital beds and that jeopardizes the lives of not just COVID-19 patients, but those who get into accidents or who are sick from other illnesses.

Churches in the Archdiocese of Toronto will continue to strictly enforce the [WorshipSafe protocols](#) that have kept our parishioners safe while in Mass. We ask that parishioners not congregate in or around the church before or after Mass.

The Archdiocese of Toronto strongly encourages those who are at an increased risk of COVID-19 to stay at home. Cardinal Thomas Collins, Archbishop of Toronto, continues his dispensation of the faithful's Sunday obligation at this time.

History of Good Friday Walk

In 1980, a few parishioners of St. Theresa's Shrine of the Little Flower, in Scarborough, decided to organize a Good Friday Way of the Cross Walk starting at St. Theresa's Church (Midland & Kingston Rd.) and ending at Our Lady of Fatima Church (St. Clair & Victoria Park). The first Walk was held on April 4, 1980 and along the way, Chapels at the following locations were visited: St. Augustine Seminary, Cardinal Newman High School, Scarboro Foreign Mission, Monastery of the Sisters of Precious Blood and Providence Villa. Two Stations of the Cross were done at each location.

The tradition continued every year until the Covid-19 Pandemic arrived last year. It was cancelled only once due to inclement weather conditions that year making the Walk unsafe, and instead the Stations were done at St. Theresa's Church.

The Good Friday Walk was open to everyone and attracted some 50-120 people every year, depending on the weather conditions. Some travelled from as far as Barrie to participate. Refreshments were served in St. Theresa's Parish Hall afterwards.

The route did not change much over the years, except that the stop at the Monastery of the Sisters of Precious Blood was omitted when the Monastery was closed several years ago. Also, over the past 10 years, security issues prevented participants from entering the premises of St. Augustine Seminary, Cardinal Newman High School and Providence Villa, requiring them to remain outside to recite the Stations of Cross.

The Knights of Columbus took over this event over 20 years ago, after the original organizers stepped down because of their age and failing health. Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, last year's Way of the Cross Walk was done virtually using Zoom but did not include any other parishes.
