# THIRTHEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME JUNE 27, 2021

#### **First Reading**

Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24
Death entered the world through the work of the devil.

#### **Responsorial Psalm**

Psalm 30:2,4,5-6,11,12,13
A prayer of thanksgiving to God for having rescued us

#### **Second Reading**

2 Corinthians 8:7,9,13-15
As Christ became poor for our sake, so must we share with those in need from our abundance.

#### **FAMILY CONNECTION**

There are many ways in which we can compare the request for healing made by Jairus and the request of the woman with the hemorrhage. One comparison helps us think about prayer. Jairus asked Jesus for healing on his daughter's behalf; the woman with the hemorrhage had no one to speak for her and bravely approached Jesus on her own initiative. In our prayers, we do both. We intercede for others' needs, and we also courageously express our own needs to God. We find hope in Jesus' response to both of these people, who sought him out in their hour of need. As you gather as a family, talk about some of the things you have prayed for this week. Notice that some of your prayers may have been for other people, and some of your prayers may have been for your own needs. In today's Gospel we find encouragement for both kinds of prayer. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 5:21-43. Talk about the similarities and differences between the two people who presented their needs to Jesus in this Gospel. Notice that both people received the healing they sought from Jesus. We want to pray for the needs of others and for our own needs with as much faith and hope as Jairus and the woman with the hemorrhage did. Pray together in thanks and praise to God, who hears our needs and answers them, by praying today's psalm, Psalm 30. (Loyolapress.com)

## Arise! Scott Hahn Reflects on the Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



God, who formed us in His imperishable image, did not intend for us to die, we hear in today's First Reading. Death entered the world through the devil's envy

Visily Polenov, 1871

and Adam and Eve's sin;

as a result, we are all bound to die.

But in the moving story in today's Gospel, we see Jesus liberate a little girl from the possession of death.

On one level, Mark is recounting an event that led the disciples to understand Jesus' authority and power over even the final enemy, death (see <u>1 Corinthians 15:26</u>). On another level, however, this episode is written to strengthen our hope that we too will be raised from the dead, along with all our loved ones who sleep in Christ (see <u>1 Corinthians 15:18</u>).

Jesus commands the girl to "Arise!"—using the same Greek word used to describe His own resurrection (see Mark 16:6). And the consoling message of today's Gospel is that Jesus is the resurrection and the life. If we believe in Him, even though we die, we will live (see John 15:25–26).

We are called to have the same faith as the parents in the Gospel today—praying for our loved ones, trusting in Jesus' promise that even death cannot keep us apart. Notice the parents follow Him even though those in their own house tell them there is no hope, and even though others ridicule Jesus' claim that the dead have only fallen asleep (see 1 Thessalonians 4:13–18).

Already in Baptism, we've been raised to new life in Christ. And the Eucharist, like the food given to the little girl today, is the pledge that He will raise us on the last day.

We should rejoice, as we sing in today's Psalm, that He has brought us up from the netherworld, the pit of death. And, as Paul exhorts in today's Epistle, we should offer our lives in thanksgiving for this gracious act, imitating Christ in our love and generosity for others.

# Step 2 of Provincial Reopening – June 30 – Implications for Churches

We are heading into Stage 2 of the reopening plan for Ontario beginning June 30<sup>th</sup>. Our parish continues to require parishioners to book tickets (register through Eventbrite) to attend Sunday Masses. This helps the church manage capacity restrictions and contact tracing.

While the percentage increased from 15% to 25%, our church can only accommodate a limited number of people due to the 6 feet (2m) distance requirement per individual or household.

REMEMBER, the pandemic continues to present a serious health threat to members in our society and beyond; the faithful are therefore reminded to follow the direction provided by ushers for seating. Please do not to congregate in large numbers in or around the church before or after services. Do not leave tissues in the pews.

Our safety protocol should be observed at all time. Your cooperation in keeping our church safe and clean will be greatly appreciated.

Thank you for your patience as we navigate this new normal. Rest assured that the safety protocol in place is meant for a greater good – the health and safety of St. Theresa's parish community.



God bless you in the Name of the Father, of the Son and of The Holy Spirit. Amen.




#### PARISH OFFICE OPERATIONS

## New Film Invites Us to Really Know the Blessed Virgin Mary

Dr. Josephine Lombardi is a faculty member at St. Augustine's Seminary in Toronto. She recently released, "The First Lady and Her Successors," a film that explores the many ways that the Blessed Mother Mary can guide us today. She discussed this new film below.

#### 1. What was the inspiration for the film?

All Christians know Mary of Nazareth is the mother of Jesus. Depending on their upbringing or catechetical background, Catholics and other Christians may not know a lot about her life or role in salvation history. The inspiration for the film was my desire for all people to know Mary of Nazareth with greater intimacy, using Scripture as the starting point.

#### 2. What is the film about?

The film is about the life of Mary, beginning with the Book of Genesis and ending with the Book of Revelation. We journey with Mary as we reflect on mysteries, events, words and actions associated with her earthly life. Accompanying us along the way, we have the stories of nine amazing women, sharing how their own life experiences help them understand and relate to Mary's journey.

#### 3. Is the film just for women?

No. Many men – including lay, religious and clergy – have watched it, sharing how the film touched them very deeply, giving them a greater insight into the life of Mary and the experiences of women. Some have shared how the insights they gained will influence the way they pray the rosary and preach.

#### 4. Is the film just for Catholics?

No. The focus of the film is Mary in Sacred Scripture. Although Marian dogmas are implied throughout, the focus is the life of Mary as found in the Bible.

#### 5. What is your hope for the film?

My hope is men and women will find Mary more accessible, relating to her life journey, knowing, with God's grace, they can be like her.
