FAMILY CONNECTION

Worries and concerns are part of human life. Jesus teaches us, however, that we ought not to let worries and concerns consume us. Jesus teaches us that our faith ought to lead us to trust in God's protection and love, no matter how strong the whirlwind going on around us. Like the disciples, we can bring our worries and concerns to Jesus in prayer. Jesus will hear our cries for help. He knows that our faith can be fragile and he will act so that our trust in God will be strengthened. As you gather as a family, invite each family member to talk about something that might be worrying them. Talk about how important it is to share worries and concerns with other people. When we do this, we learn to see our worries from a different perspective.

This Gospel is a metaphor for our lives. We are in the boat, the storms of life are raging around us, and like the disciples, we may believe that Jesus is unconcerned, or "sleeping." We hope that we will be as familiar with Jesus as his disciples. If we feel that Jesus is sleeping, are we comfortable enough to wake Jesus and present him with our needs? Jesus does not chide his disciples for waking him. Instead, he chides them for their lack of faith, for their lack of perspective. When we bring our worries to God in prayer, we might just begin to learn to see things from God's perspective.

When we bring our worries to Jesus in prayer, Jesus can help us see things from God's perspective. Invite family members to name again a worry or concern and pray together that Jesus will help us have faith in God's love and protection. Conclude in prayer together by praying the Lord's Prayer. In the Storm: Scott Hahn Reflects on the Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Do you not yet have faith?" Our Lord's question in today's Gospel frames the Sunday liturgies for the remainder of the year, which the Church calls "Ordinary Time."

In the weeks ahead, the Church's liturgy will have us journeying

with Jesus and His disciples, reliving their experience of His words and deeds, coming to know and believe in Him as they did.

Notice that today's Psalm almost provides an outline for the Gospel. We sing of sailors caught in a storm; in their desperation, they call to the Lord and He rescues them.

Mark's Gospel today also intends us to hear a strong echo of the story of the prophet Jonah. He, too, was found asleep on a boat when a life-threatening storm broke out that caused his fellow travelers to pray for deliverance, and then to marvel when the storm abated (see [Jonah 1:3-16](#)).

But Jesus is something greater than Jonah (see [Matthew 12:41](#)). And Mark wants us to come to see what the Apostles saw—that God alone has the power to rebuke the wind and the sea (see [Isaiah 50:2](#); [Psalm 18:16](#)). This is the point of today's First Reading. If even the wind and sea obey Him, shouldn't we trust Him in the chaos and storms of our own lives?

As with the Apostles, the Lord has asked each of us to cross to the other side, to leave behind our old ways to travel with Him in the little ship of the Church.

In their fear today, they call Him, "Teacher." And it is only faith in His teaching that can save us from perishing. We should trust in Christ, and trust like Christ—who was able to sleep through the storm, confident that God was with Him (see [Psalm 116:6](#); [Romans 8:31](#)).

We should live in thanksgiving for our salvation, as today's Epistle tells us—as new creations, no longer for ourselves but for Him who died for our sake. (*Taken from Breaking the Bread, Sunday Bible Reflections – St. Paul Center* (stpaulcenter.com))



Bishop and Indigenous Leader in Dialogue on Residential Schools



Chief J. Wilton "Willie" Littlechild and Edmonton's Archbishop Richard Smith recently came together in Maskwacis, Alberta to discuss reconciliation with the Indigenous peoples in Canada, and the response to the finding at the Kamloops Residential School site.

Chief Littlechild is a former Grand Chief of the Confederacy of Treaty 6 First Nations. He was also a commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, a member of the 1977 Indigenous delegation to the United Nations and worked on the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. He is a recipient of the Order of Canada, Alberta Order of Excellence and Queen's Counsel.

Archbishop Smith has been Archbishop of Edmonton since 2007. He serves as President of the Catholic Bishops of Alberta and the Northwest Territories and is past president of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Homily of Deacon John Brown on Residential Schools

"I have seen first-hand the terrible and tragic consequences of Canada's treatment of Indigenous people in the residential school system. My family on my father's side is Sto:lo from the Fraser River Valley in BC. My grandmother was a residential school survivor...

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission describes the establishment and operation of the residential schools as cultural genocide, and rightly so. The schools were created to forcibly separate Indigenous children from their families, to destroy their cultural and spiritual ties, and to assimilate them into the "white" culture.

Canadian Catholics to pray Novena to St. Joseph

The faithful in Canada are invited to pray a Novena in honor of St. Joseph from 22 – 30 June, as part of initiatives to mark the Year of St. Joseph. The year marks the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as the Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX.

In keeping with celebrating the Year of St. Joseph announced by Pope Francis in December 2020, the Canadian faithful are invited to pray a Novena in honor of the guardian of the Holy Family.

The Novena begins on 22 June and ends on 30 June, and it is followed by an Act of Entrustment on 1 July, which is also the annual commemoration of Canada Day.

During the nine days of prayer, the faithful are encouraged to pray for an end to the Covid-19 pandemic, for those who have died, for the family – the domestic Church, for peace and unity in the country, for an end to racism and discrimination, for vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life, for youth and the elderly, for frontline workers and the unemployed, and for the needy, addicted and excluded.

To aid the faithful to participate in the prayer, the National Liturgy Office of the Canadian Bishops' Conference (CCCB) has made available some [catechetical resources, devotions, and prayers for adults and children](#), including the Novena prayers and the Act of Entrustment to St. Joseph. Pope Francis proclaims "Year of St Joseph"

What Is Father's Day? Everything to Know About the Holiday's Rich History, Including When It First Started

No matter how hard you try to stay ahead of the game, Father's Day always finds a way to sneak up on you. The next time you're wondering when you have to have your Father's Day gifts, homemade cards and activities ready for your #1 guy, keep this fact in mind: Father's Day is *always* celebrated on the third Sunday in June in the United States, United Kingdom, Canada and other countries, which means this year's holiday will take place on June 20, 2021.

The annual holiday was started by Sonora Smart Dodd a few years after Mother's Day was first celebrated, to "establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents," (per History.com). It was a success from the start: The first-ever Father's Day (called Fathers' Day at the time) was celebrated on June 19, 1910 in Washington state, although it wasn't named a national holiday until President Richard Nixon signed it into law in 1972.

The way that we celebrate dad, grandpa and the other men who shape us continues to evolve from one year to the next.
